



## Chickamauga Battlefield MEMORIAL HIKE

Distance: 8.5 Miles

During the Battle of Chickamauga, eight brigade commanders (4 Union and 4 Confederate) died while leading their troops. Pyramids made of artillery shells were constructed at the sites where each of these officers received his mortal wound. This hike is dedicated to these fallen commanders. Place the answers to the following questions in the space provided.

1. Starting at the Visitor's Center, proceed south to the red horse trail. Turn left, carefully cross US-27, and follow this trail to a clearing near Alexander Bridge Road. Locate the shell monument to Peyton Colquitt. What rank was he?
2. Follow the red trail east until you find another pyramid. This monument is dedicated to Abraham Lincoln's Confederate Brother-In-Law. What was his name?
3. Continue east, turn right at the intersection and stay on the red trail. Locate the 9th Ohio Infantry marker. Turn right onto the green trail and follow this to Winfrey Field. Locate Philemon Baldwin's monument. When was he killed?
4. Go to Brotherton Road, turn right and head to the intersection. Turn left and locate the orange trail near Huggin's Battery. Follow this trail to Preston Smith's pyramid. What side did he fight for?
5. Locate the trail to the northwest and follow it to Brotherton Road. Cross the road and follow the yellow trail to James Deshler's shell monument. When was he killed?
6. Continue on this trail to Battle Line Road, then locate the shell monument near Kelly Field. Who does this pyramid honor?
7. Return to Battle Line Road, turn right and proceed south. Near the Alabama Monument follow the white horse trail, cross Brotherton Road, and continue south on the white and then the blue horse trail to Viniard-Alexander. Turn right, carefully cross US-27, and locate Hans Christian Heg's monument. What side did he fight for?
8. Follow the yellow trail north, then turn left onto the red horse trail. Cross Glenn-Kelly Road and continue on this trail until you find William Lytle's monument. Unfortunately, the shells from his pyramid were used to repair other vandalized monuments. Lytle was a well-known poet, so much so that a Confederate Officer ordered his men to guard Lytle's body after he had died. What rank was Lytle?

Continue on this trail north, cross Dyer Road, and proceed north to a dirt road and turn right. Continue on this road, go past the gate, and turn right onto the paved road. Go east on Snodgrass Road down the hill, then turn left onto Glenn-Kelly Road. Turn left onto the gated road and proceed north, then turn right to exit the woods and return to the Visitor's Center.
